10:00	<p><b>Title: Why storage technologies matters for the global energy transition?</b></p> <p>Background: The role of (non-conventional) renewable energies on the road to carbon neutrality is clear and the planet is already on the move. Countries are already committing to triple this type of generation worldwide. Nevertheless, most of the current electric systems are not designed to function safely under these highly variable energy sources, NCRE. The safe operation of the electric systems requires a steady and reliable source of energy and power and if the security of supply is not guaranteed, the energy transition may deviate from the accelerated path followed so far.</p> <p>One of the solutions that emerge is the incorporation of energy storage systems (ESS), which are useful to store the energy generated when radiation and wind are highly available and release it when wind decays or night comes, so there is an urgent need to enable the inclusion of ESS in both the regulatory and competitive mechanisms of the market.</p>	<p><b>Remarks:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1.
